Re: Support for SB411 and SB341 to fight hunger amongst California's families and children

Dear Senator Caballero,

On behalf of Catholic Charities San Francisco, I am writing to express my strong support for California Senate Bill 341 and Senate Bill 411. These pieces of legislation will have a significant impact on the health and nutritional needs of California's families and children, including many of the 70,000 individuals, families, children, and youth served by Catholic Charities annually in San Francisco, Marin, and San Mateo Counties.

- SB 411, also known as the Stop Child Hunger Act of 2025, expands access to school meals over the summer
  months by creating an accessible and secure year-round child nutrition safety net program. Schools play a vital
  role in addressing food insecurity and poor health outcomes when free meals are offered to students.<sup>1</sup> The
  expansion of this program would provide year-round nutritional support to youth who are most at risk of hunger
  and food insecurity, particularly during school breaks.
- SB 341 would provide grants and technical assistance to schools to create school gardens. While school gardens
  promote healthy eating habits and instruct students on growing similar items, data have shown that the
  presence of these gardens contributes to increased academic benefits in areas outside of gardening, such as
  math, science, and other courses. <sup>2</sup>

Collectively, these bills represent a significant step forward in supporting the needs of the most vulnerable Californians, creating more affordable and accessible housing, improving public awareness and compliance, increasing financial assistance, and expanding healthcare access. The positive impact on our communities cannot be overstated, as impacted residents will have greater opportunities to live independently, access essential services, and participate fully in community life. And our state will become more inclusive, equitable, and just.
